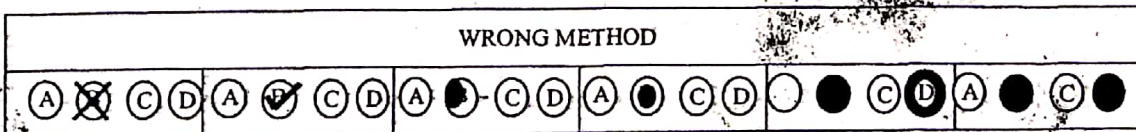

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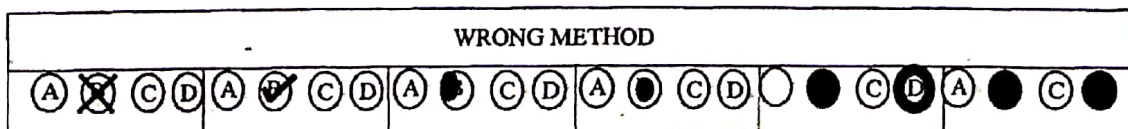

Perhaps we are most accustomed nowadays to considering a book in terms of its author: we ask how it expressed his personality, or how it illustrated the age to which he belonged. But I suggest that the primary question should be "What is its relation to us, to its living readers?" There is nothing novel in this question. "What does literature do to and for its readers?" is the stock question of all classical criticism. But I wish to go a little further, beyond the effect on the isolated individual reader, and to enquire whether the most important thing about a book is, not its relation to some past age in which it was produced, but rather its relation to this present age in which it is read. I ask you for a while to think of literature as a living force acting on the present world – that is a form of social action.

Literature acts upon us in a thousand ways. Among other things, it affirms values: writers make us care about things, feel about them, as they do. And usually they are quite explicit about it; they tell us outright what they like or dislike. The great exception may seem to be Shakespeare, and I confess that this quality in him – this ability to give both sides – is one of the chief marks of his greatness, his superiority over other writers. Yet I do not believe in Shakespeare's detachment; of course I shall not try to state his view of life, but I think one is discernible in his plays, and I should say that almost always the feelings of the reader are quite clearly directed for or against certain traits and actions of his character.

One of the functions of the literature as well as of all the arts is too often overlooked: the communication of power, the enhancement of energy. It leaves us more alive, stronger, we feel that virtue has come into us. This heightening of vitality or increase of life accounts in large measure for the joy and delight that art gives us. But the point I wish to stress is that literature not only gives us this augmented power, but, by the values it asserts, directs it. All good writers do this, but most of them act only on part, often a small part, of one; the best or greatest, however, act so upon all of one, on the whole of man. They heighten and harmonize and direct our power to think, to feel, to imagine and to will and to act. They intensify and enlarge our consciousness and awareness. And they do all this to us not as isolated individuals only, but as social beings, for by their own awareness of personal and social relations they enhance ours.
